

## **Fire Chief G. Panholzer, City of Monterey Fire Department**

*Panholzer has strong ties to the local community. His career in the fire service began at the Carmel Highlands Fire District in 1977. In addition to his strong field experience, Chief Panholzer has a background in fire training at Monterey Peninsula College, Hartnell College, Cabrillo College and the South Bay Regional Public Safety Training Consortium. He was appointed Monterey's Fire Chief in 2014. He also has served as the Director of the Monterey County Regional Fire District since 2008.*
